# Third Grade Taffy

3<sup>rd</sup> grade kicked off the new school year by building classroom communities and establishing strong class citizenship.

In reading, students have learned to turn the question around in order to answer questions in complete sentences. We have also focused on using evidence from the text to support our answers when writing a written response. To increase fluency and comprehension, have your child read aloud to you for 20 minutes each night.

In math, we have been introducing multiplication strategies. Multiplication is a huge skill for third graders and all students are expected to memorize the multiplication facts through 10 by the end of the year. Students can practice learning these facts at home by singing the skip counting songs or using flashcards. There are also several fun games to practice multiplication facts on **mathplayground.com**. The more students are able to practice at home, the more successful they will be in learning their multiplication facts.



**Howdy and welcome** to the 24-25 school year! As the School Counselor I provide a comprehensive program that meets the academic, personal-social, and career needs of **ALL** students. I work **CONFIDENTIALLY** with students and inform stakeholders of critical information on a "need to know" basis. Also, I implement effective interventions for students, but I am not a therapist.

The services I provide include classroom lessons, 6-week skill-based small group and individual counseling, consultation with teachers, administration, and parents, community referrals, attendance with Mrs. Lamontagne-Cruz, behavior with Mr. Terry, and special focus weeks, such as Week of Respect.

I started off the year in Kindergarten with our students learning great problem-solving strategies: Kelso's Choices and using "I" Messages with our peers and in 3rd, 4th, and 5th grade we completed our Panorama Social-Emotional Survey.

For the month of **September** our lesson focused on **Respect** for grades 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, and 5th. In Kindergarten we learned about our feelings and ways to cope with our big feelings. ALL feelings are OK, it is what we do with them that matters!

Week of Respect will be held October 7th - 11th, we will honor this week with dress-up days and daily activities that focus on respect for self, others, school, community, and things. We will also learn how it is important to be an Upstander and not a Bystander.

In October we will take a look into our futures and be learning about College & Career Readiness in all grades and what we can do now in our education career path. We will conclude our learning with our Annual Career Week, where community members come into classrooms to share about their jobs and large outside vehicles will be available for students to learn about specific Careers on Wheels.
