Time is simply flying by and we are more than halfway through the school year. Testing season has started and will continue through the end of the year. Please watch for information from your child's classroom teacher.

Third Grade Taffy

It's hard to believe we are more than halfway through the school year. The students have worked very hard and have learned many new skills. To kick off the second semester in reading we have been focusing on answering written response questions. We are teaching students to go back into the text to find story evidence and write a RACE response to answer the questions. (Students need to restate, answer the question, cite evidence, and explain.) This semester we will also practice typing our responses on the computer. You can support your child by having them practice their keyboarding skills at home using one of the links on Mrs. Mohr's technology page.

In math, we have spent a lot of time focusing on multiplication and division strategies, as well as learning our multiplication facts. We have also worked on finding area and perimeter, analyzing graphs to answer questions, addition and subtraction of three-digit numbers with regrouping, and rounding. Next, we will be moving onto fractions.

STAR Saddle

In STAR this month we will be getting back to routine. We will be starting with computation practice at our level followed by grade level instruction. 3rd grade will further their skills in multiplication concepts, 4th grade will be venturing into division, and 5th grade will continue to work with powers of 10 and exponents. In reading, we will be getting back into our vocabulary study followed by reading practice at our level. There will be a heavy focus on main ideas and key detail to support our writing skills. In writing we will be starting our animal research projects by using main idea and key detail to build a 5 paragraph essay. Last, homework will start coming home for extra practice.

Counselor Corral

Our current lesson focus is on **Diversity and Differences**. We will be discussing the definition of diversity, the importance of being different, and respectful ways to ask questions and learn about others' differences.

A set of house rules can make discipline easy- Children who are expected to follow rules at home are much more likely to follow rules at school. And when students follow the rules, there is more time for learning. To make rules memorable, create a short list of house rules. Focus on rules and consequences that govern the things that are your biggest concerns. In one family, it might be behavior toward siblings. In another, it might be helping out around the house. Next, come up with a catchy phrase that sums up the rule and the consequence. For example:

- If you hit, you sit. Any physical action toward a sibling will result in a time out.
- If you partake, you take part. Every family member has responsibility for meal time— from setting the table to clearing the dishes.
- **Pick up or pay up.** If your child doesn't put belongings away, place them in a closet. Once a week, your child can earn them back by completing a small chore.

Tackle friend problems before they affect school performance - Learning how to deal with "friends" who turn out not to be friends is a tough lesson for kids. And it's one that can distract your elementary schooler from academic learning and affect performance in school. Talk to your child about all of the qualities that make someone a true friend. Then, suggest your child be cautious with classmates who seem:

- Selfish. Does the person seem self-centered and manipulative? Are they using your child for personal gain?
- Phony. Does the person say one thing and then do another?
- Dishonest. Someone who wants to use a friend to cheat on a test is not really a friend at all.
- Unreliable. Did the person offer to walk home with your child after school, but then head off to someone else's house instead?

Explain that your child is worthy of real friends who are supportive. Friendship should be earned, so remind your child to be wary of people who have not earned it.

Fourth Grade Frolics

Hello Guardians,

We are beginning a new module, our class will build their knowledge about traditional stories, with a focus on story genres, such as tall tales, trickster tales, and legends. We will read texts and view videos about what lessons you can learn from characters in traditional tales. Students will also be writing expository essays focused on how understanding our world helps us to protect it. They will be responsible for writing a research report about a chosen plant or animal and explaining why that plant or animal should be protected.

Homework Reminder:

- Students are responsible for reading 20 minutes per night, 5 times a week. With the typical fourth grade reader averaging 100 words per minute, this equates to approximately 10,000 words per week.
- Students will use their nightly reading to help them complete A.R. quizzes at school. Time is given in the morning, during acceleration time, in the afternoon, and when they finish independent work early.
 <u>A.R. quizzes do not count if they are done outside of class.</u>
- Students will receive a weekly reading fluency grade based on the number of words they read each week according to the A.R. program. This scale is available on Class Dojo.

Science Savanna

We have been really busy exploring, discovering, and challenging ourselves to emerge in the worlds of Physical Science and Life Science for all grade levels. Kindergarten students have been studying Forces with Pushes & Pulls and exploring the effects of different strengths and directions on objects. First grade students have been exploring Light and Sound and planning & conducting investigations with transparent, translucent, and opaque materials while having fun with shadow puppets. Second grade students have been discovering Properties of Materials and observing & classifying various materials based on color, texture, flexibility, etc. Third grade students have been engaged with Inheritance and Traits and have become wildlife biologist studying inherited traits and acquired traits of organisms. Fourth grade students have been studying Vision and Light and developing/using models to represent how organisms process information using their senses to explore their environment.
