Library Literature



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First Grade Fairytale

We have all been working very hard daily! We are spending time with addition and subtraction, writing in complete sentences, and building our classroom community and good citizenship skills. Students are highly encouraged to read at home for at least 20 minutes each day. Not only can they read books, but also try recipes and street signs as well as labels on food items to add a twist to nightly reading. Students are also sent home with a copy of our weekly fluency passage as well. Why is reading at home so important? Take a look at this chart above and see!

In addition to becoming fluent readers, it is also important to become fluent in math. First Graders should practice counting to 120 or higher, breaking numbers apart and building numbers either by counting or using physical manipulative objects.

Remember, every experience can be a learning opportunity in our big wide world. Interacting with children and pointing out reading and math opportunities in everyday life is a wonderful way to introduce and practice useful life skills and strategies.

Kay Carl Grading Policy

Clark County School District has initiated a Grading Reform and we want you to know how it impacts you and your student here at Kay Carl. Grades will be based on academic standards, not learner behaviors. Formative tasks (classwork and quizzes) will have a weight of 15% in the gradebook and summative tasks (tests and culminating projects) will have a weight of 85%.

Assignments and tests that have not been turned in will be marked "L" in the Grade Book. The "L" has no weight in the Grade Book. Students will have two weeks from the date the task was assigned to submit or redo the assignment or test. If an assignment or test has not been turned within two weeks, the "L" will be changed to an "M" in the Grade Book and the score will become a 50%.

Students have the opportunity to redo any assignment or test one time after re-teaching by the teacher or evidence of learning is provided to the teacher. The family or student must request this opportunity within two weeks of the original due date.

Tech Talk- Manage your child's screen time by creating a family media plan

Digital devices are an important part of our world— and can be very appealing to kids. Technology helps your child discover new ideas, connect with others and access educational information for school. However, too much recreational screen time can negatively affect schoolwork, health, activity levels and face-to-face communication skills. To help your child strike a healthy balance, experts recommend creating a personalized family media plan that answers the following questions:

- •What devices do I want my child to have access to?
- •Where will devices be allowed and where will they be off-limits?
- How much time will my child be allowed to use them?

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- Will the same rules apply during weekends and school breaks?
- What content is appropriate for my child to access?
- How will I maintain consistency?
- •What consequences will there be for misusing devices?
- •What example am I setting through my own use of technology?

Social Emotional Learning- Help your child build 'intrinsic motivation'

Most parents have used rewards to motivate children at one time or another. And there's no question that reward systems work. But when the rewards stop, the motivation sometimes stops, too. Researchers have found that students who are motivated only by the desire to earn a reward for a good grade rarely do more than the minimum they need to get by.

However, when students are motivated by an inner reward, they are more likely to stick with a task. Students with intrinsic motivation learn because they're curious. They retain what they have learned longer, and they earn higher grades. To foster intrinsic motivation:

- Have your child think about an assignment before starting it. "What do I want to learn from this?"
- Help your child see progress when working on a big task.
- Offer positive feedback.
- Encourage your child to use positive self-talk. "I am capable and I will learn this!" Source: K. Cherry, "Intrinsic Motivation: Why You Do Things," Verywell Mind.
